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From Our Rabbi

The Jewish calendar is rich with dates that commemorate historical events and hold deep spiritual significance. Among these, three dates stand out for their unique blend of sorrow and joy: the 17th of Tammuz, Tisha B'Av (9th of Av), and Tu B'Av (15th of Av). Each represent pivotal moments in Jewish history, offering lessons and reflections that continue to resonate.

The 17th of Tammuz is a fast day marking the beginning of a three-week mourning period leading up to Tisha B'Av. This day commemorates several tragedies, one of which is the breaching of the walls of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 CE before the destruction of the Second Temple. The Talmud lists five calamities associated with this date, including Moses breaking the tablets upon seeing the Golden Calf (Taanit 28b).

Tisha B'Av, the ninth day of the month of Av, is considered the saddest day in the Jewish calendar. It commemorates the destruction of both Temples in Jerusalem. Tisha B'Av is a day of fasting, mourning, and reading Kinot (poems reflecting on the tragedies that have befallen the Jewish nation) and the Book of Lamentations (Eicha).

In stark contrast to the solemnity of Tisha B'Av, Tu B'Av, the 15th day of Av, is a day of joy and celebration. Historically, it marked the beginning of the grape harvest and was known as a time of matchmaking and love. The Talmud (Taanit 30b-31a) describes Tu B'Av as a joyous festival, highlighting its significance as a day of unity and new beginnings, noting several positive events associated with this date, such as the permission for intertribal marriages among the Israelites. Today, Tu B'Av has been revived as a celebration of love, emphasizing themes of unity, renewal, and hope.

There is a famous story (or myth) that Napoleon was walking through the streets of Paris one Tisha B'Av (9th of Av). As his entourage passed a synagogue, he heard wailing and crying coming from within; he sent an aide toinquire as to what had happened. The aide returned and told Napoleon that the Jews were in mourning over the loss of their Temple. Napoleon was distressed ";How come I wasn't informed? "When did this happen? Which Temple?" The aide responded, "They lost their Temple in Jerusalem on this date 1,700 years ago." Napoleon stood in silence and then said, "Certainly a people which has mourned the loss of their Temple for so long will survive to see it rebuilt!"

Arguably, this story could just be a legend, however, the idea is echoed directly in the Talmud (Taanit 30b): "Whoever mourns for Jerusalem will merit seeing its joy." Our crying is not just over the absence of a particular building. We continue to cry out in proclamation that this world is still not yet ideal. There are still things out of order and missing from the beauty and perfection we know to be around the corner of time. The movement of these Jewish dates goes from a deep sorrow and mourning, lasting three weeks, turning, almost immediately, into a time of sheer joy and celebration.

Rabbi Aaron David Borak (1892-1961) wrote: "When I was in Jerusalem in 1927, we were lucky to be at the Kotel/Western Wall on Tisha B'Av, the place of the Temple, we saw water dripping from the wall and we were awed. The Maskilim (enlightened pragmatic Jews) said it was because of the tremors of the earthquake on the 4th of Av and from that a streamlet of water opened in the Kotel, however the Hasidim and the Sephradim who were reciting Laments at the wall started dancing and singing, saying: 'the wall is crying and Israel is crying and G-d is crying.' It is a good sign that G-d want to redeem his children, as is found in the Midrash that when Jacob sits and cries, and Joseph sits and cries, and Yisrael cries, G-d sits and creates the Light of the Messiah.

Crying is a continuous protest, demonstrating our refusal to conform and accept the imperfections and deficiencies, still, within our world. Humanity, still, has fissures to mend and repair. Nonetheless, the Jewish calendar reveals an awareness that regardless of the length of our mourning period, the joy of redemption can and will happen momentarily. The Talmud Makkot (24b) ends with the story of Rabbi Akiva laughing at the site of a fox roaming around the destroyed remains of the Beit HaMikdash/Holy Temple. The Sages, with tears in their eyes, ask him: "Akiva, why are you laughing?" His response: "Why are you weeping?" The Sages say: "We see a place so sacred...is now desecrated by a fox parading there...so how can we not cry "For that very reason, explained Rabbi Akiva, "I laugh with joy. The prophecy of Uriah regarding the destruction and exile concludes with Har Habayit/The Temple Mount turning into a jungle. Until that came true, I dared not yet look forward to the fulfillment of the prophecy of Zecharia regarding redemption. Now that I see that fox, I realize the first prophecy has been fulfilled and I can begin to look forward to the fulfillment of the second."

Our crying and praying and efforts to bring beauty into this world will not quit until we win. The vision and promise of hope and expectation drive us forward towards a Divine goal. One day, soon, we WILL have lasting and permanent peace, love WILL bind all people, and every day WILL be like Tu B'Av - a celebration of all, for all! Amen!

Well it's summer and at Temple B'nai Jacob many of you are going on vacation. Jewish Holidays are also on vacation. In July and August, normally we would start to get ready for the High Holidays. 
As I started thinking about what to write, I remembered that I once read that summer vacations reduce stress, boost brain power and creativity, improve sleep, blah blah blah. When I think of summer vacation, it reminds me of school, camp, and travel. I'm not sure it reduced stress and boosted my brain power, but I'll take the experts' word for it. As a member of the retired community in South Florida, summer vacation is just two ordinary words. However, I feel that I still travel more in the summer than I do in other seasons. Maybe I just want to get out of the hot weather? I'm told that sunlight helps the body produce serotonin, a hormone that regulates our moods. It makes sense then that kids are physically predisposed to be in better moods during the summer. In addition, spending time outside can help improve overall physical health which is closely linked to better mental health. In South Florida, I wonder what spending a lot time in air conditioning does to mental health.

You might wonder how I connect this article with Jewishness. This year's "Summer Solstice" was on June 20 th, the longest day of the year. Jews have not traditionally had a summer solstice ritual per se, but Medieval European Jews marked the summer solstice by not drawing water, because they believed that water might be affected by the "eerie power" of the day. When I looked up the definition of what "drawing water" means I saw that it refers to the "act of extracting or collecting water from a source such as a well, tap, or natural body of water." It can involve using various tools or methods, such as a pump, bucket, or faucet, to obtain the water for purposes such as drinking, cleaning, or irrigation. Now, I don't believe that not drinking water is a good thing. After all, the weather in South Florida is above 90+ degrees in the summer. A number of biblical events in Jewish legend actually happened during the summer solstice, including the expulsion from Eden and the moment when Moses struck the rock to get water for the Jewish people. Miriam's expulsion from the camp and her seven days in the desert also took place around this time.

OK, I know this was a stretch, but to all our friends and family of Temple B'nai Jacob, I wish a great summer vacation and lots of water to drink!!



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
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
