From Our Rabbi



"The best tunes are played on the oldest fiddles!" - Ralph Waldo Emerson

When it comes to the finer indulgences of life, aging is key. From cigars to wine, cheeses to whiskey, the longer they're left to age and mature, the more desirable they become. Interestingly enough, the idea of "aging" is far less desirable among people. From Botox shots being demanded by younger patients each year, to the increased use of intense photo filters on Facebook and Instagram, there seems to be an obsession to look and feel younger. Our society doesn't seem to respect or appreciate the value of maturing.

Columnist, Hannah Bohn, wrote in her article November 2021 article, *Let Your Hair Down: A society obsessed with aging, "*According to a 2019 study by Ipsos Global Advisor, 60% of Americans feel negatively about aging. According to a 2014 survey by Pfizer, 87% of Americans said they were afraid of getting old, and a 2017 review by the American Psychological Association found that people fret over perceived age-related issues such as memory loss and struggle with loneliness at far higher rates than they are actually experienced." She continues that in 2021, "the size of the anti-aging market alone was worth \$17.44 billion and is expected to reach \$22.47 billion by 2026." Most Americans (at least) seem to be willing to spend and do just about anything to look and feel young.

A thought came to me this year while thinking about Chanukah. Many of us are familiar with the famous debate between the great Talmudic figures, Hillel and Shammai, regarding the method of lighting one's Menorah on Chanukah. Shammai believed we should light all 8 candles the first night, move down the list each subsequent night, ending the holiday by lighting only 1 candle on the

last night. He suggested that his order is based upon how many days remain of the holiday. Hillel, alternatively (and how we practice), suggested that each night we add a candle, beginning the holiday by lighting 1 candle and ending off the eighth night of Chanukah with a fully bright Menorah of 8 lit candles. The reasoning stated in Talmud Shabbat 21b is: " - "דמעלין בקדש ואין מורידין" One elevates in sanctity and does not downgrade."



Perhaps, there is a hidden insight about growing older behind the brilliant lights of the Chanukiah/Chanukah Menorah. Our Torah (Leviticus 19:32) shares a Mitzvah by stating: "- "מְפְנֵי שֵׁיְבָה You shall rise before the aged and show honor to the old…" The word Zaken, "old" in Hebrew, as taught in Talmud and explained by 14 century commentary, Rebbeinu Bechya, is an acronym of the words "Zeh Kannah (Chochmah)" - "One who acquired wisdom." Judaism views aging as a process of growth that is sacred and should be sanctified. We may take encouragement from the title of Reb Zalman Schachter-Shalomi's book; "From Age-ing to Sage-ing: A Revolutionary Approach to Growing Older." Jewish Law demands we show respect and reverence for elders as, with age and maturity, there is wisdom. The added candle each year on our birthday cake should make us feel proud and wonderful. We are growing into more of a "Sage" with each passing year. When we gaze at the lights of our Chanukah Menorah this year, let's remind ourselves of the beauty and sanctity of increasing the numbers of days and years of our brilliance.

19th century, German, Rabbi Hirsch commented: "He who honors the aged honors experience; he honors the natural human perception which matures through the repeated events of life and nature. He who honors elders honors wisdom... And whenever we find them, in the aged and in the wise, we are to show homage by honoring and rising." We should be proud to display the wisdom that comes with our aging and own our level of experiences that can turn that aging into Sage-ing.

Jimmy Buffett said: "wrinkles will only go where the smiles have been." May we celebrate this year and every added year of our lives with the Joy, Laughter, and Smiles it takes to have Holy Wrinkles! Happy Chanukah!!!

Message from our Co-President



What a wonderful High Holiday season! From Rosh Hashana to Yom Kippur, from Sukkot to Shemini Artzeret and Simchat Torah - it is a long month with so much going on, but I feel grateful to have the opportunity to start fresh and I hope all our TBJ members and friends feel the same.

During one of Rabbi Dan's High Holiday sermons, he spoke briefly about how many of us wonder why we don't have more of a connection to God and to our Jewish religion. We tell ourselves that because of that lack of connection, we don't need anything more, and that is why we just attend services a few times a year, mostly during the HH's. To counter that point, Rabbi Dan reminded us that our education in any other area doesn't end at 12 years old: politics, sports, money, careers, relationships, hobbies, and countless other fields. We continue to learn as we mature, and our thoughts and feelings on these topics often develop as well. So why would we think that our feelings on God and religion would be any different? So many of us stall our religious learning shortly after our Bar and Bat Mitzvahs and then can't understand why as adults, our connection to Judaism and God is not closer. If we stop studying, doesn't it stand to reason that our understanding of those vast topics would also be stuck in a 12-year old's mind and heart?

Taking the thought process one step further, Rabbi Dan even compared religion to exercise, reminding us that just as we can't expect to maintain a healthy body by exercising 2 or 3 times a year, we can't expect to sustain a healthy spiritual life by stopping that "exercise" at middle school (Bar & amp; Bat Mitzvah age), and only "working out" a few times a year since then. This analogy really hit home for me. I feel grateful that over the past decade I have been able to renew my bond to the Jewish religion and to God. I "exercise" by coming to services regularly, attending some classes, participating in Women's League events, and even learning to chant Haftorah. As doctors and sports enthusiasts remind you to change things up and not get bored by your exercise routine, I am following the same direction in my spiritual development. I am stretching my mind, my heart, and my soul – and feel I am better for it. I am appreciative for the connections I have made with the wonderful people of Temple B'nai Jacob, both past and present.

I hope whether you attended services on Zoom or in person, you felt a connection and that you'll consider attending services or events more often. We can always use help on our various committees – depending on your interests. We have a long list of activities, and we'd love to get you involved: event planning, fundraising, education (religious school and adult), finance, membership, sunshine, special events, etc. Whatever your interest – we have a place for you. Please call or email and we will get you involved!

And on that note, just a few words on the incredible effort it took to put High Holiday services together this year. First it was the decision to have services at our synagogue, rather than the Village of Wellington - I personally feel it was a good choice. By having services at our home, we received the benefit of just that – being home. We didn't have to be perfect, but if you attended you knew you had family and friends around you, a place where you felt comfortable. That is what I think of our shul. At times seating may have been a bit tight, we never had to turn anyone away. And in fact, we were able to welcome folks coming to us after suffering Hurricane Ian's devastating loss. The door is always open – that is home.

This year also brought us Cantor Angress, who led us in prayer with his lovely voice, and who represented us well as he spoke to Hashem on our behalf. At times his voice was hauntingly beautiful, and other times it was filled with Ruach. I could look around the synagogue and see how his voice transfixed us.

I can't go without thanking all the "behind the scenes" people that made our holidays a success. Without them – there would be no services! From our Ritual Committee, led by Sallee Silverman; to our ever-present Safety & amp; Security Coordinator, our one and only Dean Bennett; to those who organized and proof-read our Yizkor book, Lenore Glickman, Liz Thal & amp; Morry Silverman; to Alan Cohan, who ensured the Torah and Bimah were dressed appropriately and position correctly prior to each service; to so many others who handle an enormous number of details so that we are able to run the show seamlessly. And for those of you who participated "in front of the camera" – a huge thank you to you as well. For those who chanted Torah and Haftorah, blew the Shofar, lifted and tied the Torah - thank you all!!! Your efforts do not go unnoticed, and I wish I had room to name everyone!

And a special Todah Rabah to Rabbi Dan. He is spiritual and funny, warm, and welcoming. He has a wealth of knowledge, providing insights into the text and demonstrating their real-world applications. He fosters a love of the Jewish religion. I hope you found all this contagious.
